I'm hoping that everyone had a pleasant and rewarding summer. We enjoyed lots of travel and spent some wonderful times with family and friends.



Annual Donation Honors Stukely Westcott and His Descendants



On April 4, 1993, **Betty Westcott Acker**, then the Historian of the Wescott Society, attended Plam Sunday service at the meeting house on North Main Street in Providence, R.I. that has been the home of the First Baptist Church in America since 1775. After a tour of the meeting house, Betty donated to the church's Easter Lily Fund in honor of Stukely Westcott, a founding member of the church. And Betty made sure the donation

became an annual tradition and one of the responsibilities of the Westcott Society Historian enumerated in the by-laws. It is an obligation I joyfully fulfill, arranging a donation this year of \$100 in honor of Stukely and Juliana Westcott and in memory of **Wilma W. Avery** of Arkansas and **Leroy Westcott** of Arizona, society members who died since the previous donation. The practice has evolved as we now donate "to the ministries of the church in Providence" with the admonition "Please spend it wherever it can blossom."

The First Baptist Church in America was formed in 1638 when Stukely and other followers of Roger Williams gathered in Williams' Providence home for worship. During the meeting, Ezekiel Holliman baptized Williams, who in turn baptized twelve others including Stukely Westcott (and presumably, Juliana), Ezekiel Holliman and William Arnold. A few years later when the Westcotts moved to the new settlement of Shawomet (later renamed Warwick) to the south of Providence, Stukely Westcott, Ezekiel Holliman and William Arnold formed the First Baptist Church of Warwick.

Many Westcott descendants – both those who remained in Rhode Island and those who migrated north and west – actively professed their Baptist faith. For example, in the 18th century, Nathan Westcott (Nathan⁴, Josiah³, Jeremiah², Stukely¹) was a popular speaker at meetings of Six-Principle Baptist congregations throughout the Rhode Island Colony. And in the 1800s, Stukely Westcott, Jr. (Stukely Jr.⁶, Stukely⁵, Stukely⁴, Stukely³, Jeremiah², Stukely¹) gradually migrated through Massachusetts and Vermont, joining the local Baptist church at each stop, and finally settled in New York, where he became

This church, founded by Roger Williams in 1638, is the oldest Baptist Church in America.

Its first house of worship was built in 1700.

a deacon of the Canton Baptist church. This is not to say that a Baptist profession is a Westcott requisite. That would be contrary to the deep belief in religious freedom and **Soul Liberty** of the founding members of the Providence church.

In June 1935, the first reunion of the Westcott Society met in Salem, Massachusetts, and then moved the festivities to Providence, which included a visit to the First Baptist Church in America. And since then, reunions in the Providence area have always scheduled a visit to the meeting house.

During the 2019 Westcott trip to England to celebrate the 400th anniversary of Stukely and Juliana's marriage at the Church of St. John the Baptist in Yeovil, the travelers carried with them a *letter of*

transfer from Pastor Jamie Washam of the First Baptist Church in America recommending acceptance of the Westcotts and their descendants "albeit 400 years later." On Sunday the Westcott cousins participated in the All Generations service at St. John's, during which SSWDA Chaplain Laura Westcott read from Pastor Jamie's letter: "We trust that the doctrinal issues that divided our forebearers are now surpassed by the kinship we share in the love and way of Jesus Christ."
